"Domestic violence includes willful intimidation, physical assault, battery, sexual assault, and other abusive behaviors as part of a systematic pattern of power and control perpetrated by one person over another."






Domestic Violence in the U.S.

- Domestic violence can affect anyone, but over 85% of victims identify as women.
- Approximately 1 in 4 women and 1 in 7 men will be affected by domestic violence in their lifetime.
- In New Jersey, domestic violence occurs every 8 minutes and 52 seconds.
- Nationally, more than 10 million adult victims and 3-4 million children are affected each year.
- > As a social problem, it costs the U.S. \$5.8 billion each year in medical and mental health care.

A Rising Public Health Crisis

- ▶ Nearly 3 persons are murdered every day by a current or former romantic partner.
- In the U.S., domestic violence homicides comprise 40-50% of all murders of women.
- Of the 11 murder-suicides that occur each week in America, 72% involve an intimate partner.
- 20% of all victims are NOT partners or primary targets of abuse.



The "Ingredients" for Violence: The Social Ecological Model



- Negative attitudes towards women; Associating masculinity with aggression; History of child abuse
- Family members that accept violence against women and do not intervene
- Lives in a neighborhood where domestic disputes are ignored; Counseling services unavailable
- Laws did not mandate risk assessment or inhibit the future purchasing of weapons

What Are We Missing?

- More widely accessible mental health services
- ☐ More gun legislation that takes into account histories of domestic violence
- More training on how to conduct lethality assessments
- And most importantly...

Solutions that address the community- and society-level factors that enable violence to occur in the first place and to continue post-intervention!

- ➤ How do we normalize abuse in relationships and justify not intervening in "private matters"?
- ➤ How do we provide survivors with the tools and resources necessary to detect/leave abusive relationships?
- Why do boys and men still represent the majority of perpetrators?
- How do our notions about masculinity affect men's abilities to navigate power struggles healthily and to seek help when coping with rejection or anger? How does it affect conversations about mental health and gun legislation?
- What role does gender, race, and class have in the way beliefs about toxic entitlement are fostered?
