OVERVIEW

The New Jersey Child Welfare Training Partnership (NJCWTP) is a collaborative effort between the New Jersey Department of Children and Families (DCF) Office of Training and Professional Development (OTPD) and a university partnership that includes the Institute for Families at Rutgers School of Social Work (Rutgers) and the Child Welfare Education Institute at Stockton University (Stockton). Established in 2007, the Partnership assists DCF in providing professional development to staff, largely within the Division of Child Protection and Permanency (DCP&P). The initial focus of the Partnership's training was to implement change in the state's culture of child welfare practice, supporting movement from a case management service delivery model to the state's current strength-based, family-centered, and child-focused model.

The NJCWTP builds the skills and knowledge of more than 5,000 professionals dedicated to the safety, permanency, and well-being of children and families across the state. Training classes are offered year-round at training locations throughout the state, largely in DCP&P local offices and

at the DCF Professional Center in New Brunswick. New DCP&P workers attend pre-service trainings that prepare them for their role with families. Courses explore the history and mandate of child protection in NJ, the process of assessing risks and safety concerns, child development, and electronic records systems. Essential/mandatory courses are required trainings that offer fundamental information on building skills critical to child welfare professionals and their work with families. These courses especially prepare workers for the overlapping issues between child welfare,



mental health, domestic violence, and substance use. Elective courses supplement the learning required of all workers with topics relevant to effective support of vulnerable families while addressing targeted issues that put the safety of children at risk.

While essential/mandatory courses are required by DCF/DCP&P for specific roles and functions, elective courses are generally attended at a supervisor's recommendation or a worker's choice. Due to the curriculum development efforts by the University Partnership, DCP&P staff enjoy a variety of course offerings to fulfill their annual training requirement. Additionally, the Training Partnership has provided trainings for DCF-contracted community providers when practice efforts with external vendors overlap or when there is an aim for integration. These topics have included Protective Factors, Youth Thrive, and Human Trafficking.




Training Days and Attendance

During the first half of FY 2019, the University Partnership and OTPD delivered 65 and 40 unique course titles, respectively. There was 1 course title that both delivered/co-trained. In total, the NJCWTP delivered 95 unique course titles to DCF learners through 438 total classes and 796.5 training days. For OTPD, the most frequently run course was Car Seat Safety – 003, delivered 33 times. For the University Partnership, the most frequently run course was 223 – LGBTQI Cultural Competency, delivered 23 times.

**Reporting Period Note: Regarding Courses 554 – Bringing the Protective Factors to Life (Delivered 10 times, 495 trainees), 26 – Introduction to Testifying in Court (Delivered 3 times, 70 trainees), and 40 – Domestic Violence (Delivered 6 times, 316 trainees): These three courses were also delivered to caseworkers by providers other than Rutgers, Stockton, and OTPD.

Training Evaluation: Knowledge Gain

The Training Partnership utilizes two methods, both based on Kirkpatrick's Model of Training Evaluation, to evaluate the delivery and impact of training course content from the trainee perspective. The first method is through satisfaction surveys, which measure the degree to which participants find the training favorable, engaging, and relevant to their practice (Level 1). Further



detail and the results of the satisfaction surveys are provided later in this report. The second method is through pre/posttests, which measure whether participants acquired knowledge due to their experience in the training (Level 2). Participants are asked to complete a multiple choice test before participating in a training. After a training is completed, the same multiple choice test is readministered. Tests are created by the course writers, instructors, and/or Rutgers' evaluation team. The majority of tests consist of 20 questions. Pre/posttests are currently administered in paper format. Each test is unique to the course objectives. For the

purposes of this report, the participants' knowledge gain was computed as the difference in average test scores (percent correct) before and after each training session.

The goal of Rutgers' evaluation team is to write pre/posttest questions that strike the correct balance between difficulty, clarity, and adherence to learning objectives. Rutgers strives to conduct fair tests that reflect the material being taught. Rutgers regularly reviews tests that are either new or in need of revision due to an updated curriculum and/or poor test performance. A revision committee regularly meets to discuss improvements to pre/posttests used in training courses. Depending on the needs of each test, the revision committee includes members of the Rutgers' evaluation team, university partners, trainers, and curriculum writers. The goal of these revisions is to strengthen tests and accurately assess knowledge gain.

Reporting Period Results

In the first half of FY 2019, there were 70 courses in which pre/posttests were administered, comprising 31 essential/mandatory and 39 elective courses. Passing scores for posttests are set by OTPD. For essential/mandatory classes, a learner must score 80% or higher on their posttest or they are asked to revisit the assessment or class experience. For elective classes, a learner must score 70% or higher. All tests for essential/mandatory courses offered between July and December had average passing scores, except for Family Preservation: New Worker Module 2 of 3 – 503, 504. All tests for elective courses had average passing scores. The overall average pretest score was 59%, and the average posttest score was 88%. On average, there was a +29 point increase from pretest to posttest. A comprehensive listing of all pre/posttest scores are in Appendix A. Separated by course type, these tables present overall scores, number of test takers, and point change. In some cases, the number of learners completing the pretest and posttest differ. Most commonly, the number of pretest responses is lower. This is most likely due to participants not completing the pretest due to late arrival.

The test revision committee completed 17 test revisions between July and December 2018, as illustrated in the following table. Pre/posttests are selected for review and revision based on several channels. There is ongoing oversight of courses that have particularly low posttest scores. Learners may provide comments on their satisfaction surveys about any test item that appears misaligned or difficult. Additionally, facilitators may provide feedback on test items through their trainer feedback reports after each assignment. In each case, data are examined by the Rutgers' evaluation team to better understand why tests do not perform well. For example, analyses are conducted by trainer, time period, and test item to understand trends and how improvements can be made.

Reporting Period Notes:

Some Partnership courses do not have pre/posttests due to the nature of the class content. Examples of courses without pre/posttests are New Worker's Orientation: Welcome to DCF! - 001, Excel Training: Beginners Level - 152, Administrative Hearings - 19, and Everyday Self-Defense for Social Workers - 273.

Revisions were made to the following two tests in July 2018 without a formal meeting of the Pre/Posttest Revision Committee: Mental Health Screening Tool – 36 and Kinship Adoption – 802. No formal meeting was needed due to minor revisions to a few questions.

Training Evaluation: Participant Satisfaction

Each training class participant is asked to complete an evaluation survey at the end of the workshop to assess their satisfaction with the learning experience. The survey focuses on assessing satisfaction with the training experience and solicits feedback on the training, materials, and instructor(s). The same evaluation survey is administered at the end of each course in paper format and distributed by instructors to course participants after completion of the training session.

Satisfaction with the workshop is rated on a four-point, Likert-type scale with responses ranging from one (strongly disagree) to four (strongly agree). The satisfaction survey includes ten items, listed below.

- 1. The trainer was able to engage participants.
- 2. The trainer demonstrated expertise related to the training topic through her/his knowledge, skills, and practice experience.
- 3. The trainer's presentation was clear, concise, and organized, resulting in an effective training.
- 4. The trainer was able to answer participants' questions.
- 5. The content of the curriculum/training materials provided me with knowledge and skills I will need to meet my responsibilities in this area of work.
- 6. The instructional materials (PowerPoint slides, handouts, and participant manual) were helpful to building participants' knowledge and skills in this topic.
- 7. The activities (role plays, small group exercises, lectures, and discussions) were helpful to building participants' knowledge and skills in this topic.
- 8. The training curriculum provided different instructional activities in a way that will enable participants to use the information with children and families.
- Children and families will benefit from knowledge and skills participants gained during this training.
- 10. Overall, the training was a useful experience.

The survey also invites comments from participants through an open-ended question: "Please provide any additional comments on your training experience."

University Partnership trainers ask participants to place their completed surveys into a large manila envelope, which is subsequently sealed and returned to the University Partnership. Similarly, OTPD trainers ask participants to place their completed surveys into a large manila envelope, which is then sealed and delivered to the front office at the Professional Center. Rutgers reviews and electronically inputs all satisfaction surveys, qualitative comments, and pre/posttests for University Partnership courses before analysis. After scanning their own satisfaction surveys and pre/posttests, OTPD forwards the data to Rutgers for analysis and reporting. Quantitative data are analyzed primarily using frequencies and means.

Training team staff review participants' comments on these surveys (by review of all handwritten paper copies) and address any areas where improvements can be made, such as trainer delivery,

preparedness, and pre/posttest questions. The Partnership has responded with immediacy when a majority of trainees has expressed a common sentiment regarding a training.

Summary of Findings

There were 9,469 participant responses* from satisfaction surveys representing 88 course titles included in this half year reporting period. Possible scores range from 1 (strongly disagree – low satisfaction) to 4 (strongly agree – high satisfaction). On average, trainees reported high levels of satisfaction with the trainings, materials, and trainers. Only small differences were documented. The overall mean satisfaction ratings for all courses ranged from 3.68 (activities were helpful to building participants' knowledge and skills in this topic and the training curriculum provided different instructional activities in a way that will enable participants to use the information with children and families) to 3.74 (the trainer demonstrated expertise related to the training topic through their knowledge, skills, and practice experience). Essential/mandatory trainings had an average score of 3.72 and elective trainings had an average score of 3.67.

Analyses of satisfaction scores by course title and type are presented below. While there is not much variation across the aggregate satisfaction ratings for courses, there is greater variation in the satisfaction ratings by individual learners or individual classes. For this reason, each satisfaction survey is reviewed, and cohorts of courses are manually reviewed for comments and experiences.

*While approximately 18,000 duplicated participants were trained between July and December, only 9,469 satisfaction surveys were received. Several factors may be attributed to this difference. Participants who attend multi-day courses complete only one satisfaction survey at the end of the last training day. Second, surveys may not have been reported to Rutgers in time to be included in this report. Finally, in some cases, trainees may not have filled out a survey.

A summary of the satisfaction survey comments from the University Partnership courses are provided in Appendix C. Common themes are reported in this summary, including those that are favorable and those that raise areas for improvement or immediate attention. Comments are provided verbatim. Exceptions include removal of information that would identify individual trainers or participants. Satisfaction comments for courses conducted by the OTPD are not included in Appendix C.

Trainer Feedback Report

On January 1, 2017, the University Partnership implemented a trainer feedback report, an online form that all Partnership trainers are to complete within 48 hours of the last training day. This tool documents each facilitator's feedback about the curriculum content, course delivery, and engagement of participants. Partnership staff monitor responses in order to keep abreast of issues that need immediate attention, and they track those responses that guide ongoing improvement efforts. Trainers' responses reflect information about training sites and needed updates to curricula (e.g. policy updates, statistics, videos) and pre/posttest questions. Snapshots of the quantitative results from this version of the trainer feedback report are presented below. The number of respondents varies by question, since some respondents did not answer every question either as a result of the skip logic of the survey or the respondent's choice not to answer all questions.

Between July and December 2018, facilitators completed 429 trainer feedback reports for the 438 classes conducted. Of the 429 reports submitted, 312 (73%) were completed by University Partnership trainers for the 272 classes conducted, and 117 (27%) were completed by OTPD trainers for the 166 classes conducted. For University Partnership, a trainer feedback report was completed for all but 3 trainings between July and December 2018. The University Partnership had 40 more trainer feedback reports than courses delivered, which was due to co-trainings for which both trainers completed a trainer feedback report.

University Partnership Deliverables

Progress and Activities

While this six-month report provides an overview of all levels of service for the New Jersey Child Welfare Training Partnership, the following tables offer additional details on the activities and progress of contract deliverables assigned to the University Partnership.

GOAL: Deliver 800 days of professional development to support the knowledge and skills of the NJDCF & DCP&P workforce through a scheduled series of essential/mandatory courses and elective courses determined by OTPD.

6 MONTH OUTPUT:

As of December 2018, a total of 437 training days were coordinated and delivered, representing 190 essential/mandatory courses and 82 elective courses in more than 20 different venues around the state. Attendance has been updated and all evaluations materials have been analyzed in this report.
