All courses are three credits, with the exception of the practicum and seminars, which differ by semester.

Practicum Learning Curricular Requirements

Students in the blended MSW program complete 900 hours of practicum during the program, 400 in the first three semesters of placement (generalist practicum 1, 2 and 3) and 500 in the following three semesters of placement (specialized practicum 4, 5, and 6.) The schedules are as follows:

Courses must be taken in the above sequence and practicum hours must be completed in the above sequence. Only after successful completion of the generalist courses, generalist practicum hours and the statistics requirement, can students begin the specialized curriculum. **Placements cannot be provided for evening and weekends only. It is the responsibility of the student to have the hours available to do the practicum, Monday –Friday during the business day (9-5).** There may be placements that offer some weekend and evening hours, but this cannot be guaranteed.

Generalist Curriculum

All students, except those with baccalaureate degrees from programs accredited by the Council on Social Work Education, are required to take all of the generalist courses. These courses contain a body of knowledge, values, and skills essential for social work practice. This common base is transferable among settings, population groups, and problem areas. The generalist curriculum consists of courses in generalist social work practice with corresponding practicum instruction, human behavior and the social environment, clinical assessment & diagnosis, introductory social work research methods, social welfare policy and services, and a course focused on diversity and oppression. Successful completion of the generalist program is required before beginning the specialized curriculum.

Specialized Curriculum

The specialized curriculum consists of a specialization in a method of either advanced clinical practice or management and policy, an advanced research course, advanced practicum instruction, and electives. Only after successful completion of the generalist courses and the statistics requirement can students begin the specialized curriculum.

Courses required for the specialization and which must be taken concurrently with a practicum are:

On-campus/Online course requirements

Students in the Blended program complete both online and on-campus course work during their time in the program.

On-campus course requirements: In the third semester, students are required to take the Practicum Skills Seminar on-campus – this seminar will meet 4 times via video conferencing during the Summer semester and counts toward practicum hours. Practicum seminar sections will be offered at different times/days (evening/weekend options will be available; students will select one section) and will require 4 live sessions, each class will meet for approximately 3 hours. Students will also participate in a Reflective Practice Seminar, which will require 5 live/synchronous online sessions.

The advanced practice courses in Year 3 (Clinical SW I/II or Management Practice Theory/Strategic Planning) are required to be taken on-campus. Students may choose to take other courses in the curriculum on-campus but will be guaranteed a spot in online course sections for required courses. Course options for online electives, distribution requirements and policy courses may vary based on availability and demand.

For students pursuing certificate programs, course requirements may necessitate on-campus course options instead of the online electives that are offered.

State social work boards determine the requirements for social work licensure. Prospective students should contact their state licensing board to determine if this online program meets licensure requirements.
